They're Only Original Once

I have heard some misconceptions lately about the HPOF class so let's take a closer look at the Historcal Preservation Original Features Class or as a lot of people call it, The Original Class.

HPOF was created in 1988 to reward and provide incentives to keep vehicles in their origi-

nal unaltered state and provide a living history of how factories manufactured these vehicles. They also serve as a record of how these vehicles should be restored.

There are two major areas evaluated in HPOF; maintenance and preservation. An HPOF vehicle is one that retains its original components and features not restored or altered. It must be an authentic vehicle as the dealer could have prepared for delivery to the customer with any feature, option, or accessory in factory literature or company directives for the model year of the vehicle. These are the same standards as class judging.

With HPOF, if a component serves the purpose for which it was intended, it's acceptable in most cases. For example, a bumper with some scratches and dings would be fine but one where all the chrome has flaked off and has holes rusted through would not be acceptable. There must be enough of the original vehicle left to be an example to a restorer.

Maintenance - Maintenance items are parts that will eventually have to be replaced if the vehicle is driven. Examples are batteries, belts, brakes, compressors, fuel pumps, hoses, alternators, tires, water pumps, and many other parts. Maintaining a vehicle is vital to its longevity so replacing maintenance items is not only accepted but it is encouraged and will not have a negative effect on the certification of the vehicle. Note that period correct replacements should be used and installed correctly.

Preservation: Many damaged exterior items can be replaced with NOS parts or better examples from salvage with no effect on the certification of the vehicle. Examples include bumpers, hoods, fenders, running boards, trunk lids, and most trim pieces. The same thing goes for many interior items as well.

Searching the local salvage yards, swap meets, eBay, Hemmings, or other sources to find a correct replacement might take a while but part of the fun of the old car hobby is the hunt.

Coker Family Sells Tire Business

CEO Wade Kawasaki leads group that buys Coker Tire and related businesses

Sixty years after Harold Coker started his tire business in Athens, Tennessee, the Coker family has sold the tire and antique wheel production business to the company's management team, backed by the private equity firm of Irving Place Capital.

Coker Group CEO Wade Kawasaki announced today that he is leading a management buyout of Coker Tire, Wheel Vintiques, Universal Vintage Tire, Phoenix Race Tires, Specialty Wheel and Roadster Wire Wheel brands.

The sale comes after five years of continuous growth for the Coker Group under Kawasaki, who Corky Coker brought to Chattanooga to run the company and who will remain at the helm of the business after the sale.

Coker Tire Company, Inc., based in Chattanooga, is the world's largest manufacturer and supplier of collector vehicle tires and motorcycle tires with distributors in more than 30 countries for such brands as Firestone, Michelin, U.S. Royal and BFGoodrich. In an announcement of the sale, Kawasaki said the Coker Group will continue to operate under the same leadership team and staff while expanding both its range of products and its portfolio of companies.

Corky Coker, the son of the company founder, the late Harold Coker, retired from the tire business in 2014 but he will continue to own and operate the Honest Charley Speed Shop and his property management company in Chattanooga with his children.

"I would like to thank Corky Coker for his decades of leadership at Coker Tire and for the confidence and trust he has placed in me as I have led the company and positioned it for the next chapter," Kawasaki said today in an announcement of the sale. "We intend to accelerate growth with our partners at Irving Place Capital as we expand into newer models and markets while continuing to serve the traditional restoration market that has been our home for six decades."

Corky's father, Harold Coker, founded Coker Tire in 1958 as a local tire store, which grew over the years until Corky took the reins and began aggressively expanding the product line to support the booming restoration market. The company grew its

offerings to include the hot rod, muscle car, motorcycle, motorsports and import markets.

"After my retirement in 2014, the Coker Group flourished under the leadership of Wade and his team," Coker said. "Coker Group has been and will continue to be committed to our core vintage customer and I have full confidence that this next step will be terrific for the company and the employees. The collector car market is evolving, and with the current surge in interest in 1970s, 1980s and even 90s vehicles, no one is better suited to expand the company strategically than Wade, who has always had a deep appreciation for these vehicles."

Irving Place Capital is an active investor in the consumer, industrial and packaging sectors, including the high-performance vehicle aftermarket through its ownership of Dynojet Research. Irving Place Capital Co-Managing Partner Phil Carpenter worked with aftermarket veteran Dan Gresham and Kawasaki on the transaction.

"We are excited to work with Wade and the Coker Group —this partnership positions the company for long-term growth both domestically and internationally," Carpenter said. "The Coker family built a brand and a portfolio of companies that are beloved by enthusiasts around the world. By partnering with Wade and his team we will together advance that legacy well into the future."

Lillian Coker, the co-founder of the company, said today "it is sad to see this part of my life come to a close" and the conclusion of a dream her husband, Harold, began in 1958.

"But as I thought about it, we all must come to a time of change and this change will be new ownership of Coker Tire," she said. "So it is my hope and prayer that those who carry Coker Tire Company into the future will be as blessed as we have been."

Lillian Coker said the key to the company's success over six decades has come in customer service.

"If you serve people well, profits will come," she said Harold once said. "If profit is your only motive, you won't do as well." "May God bless those who carry it into the future," she added.

Editor's note: The Coker family were early members of the East Tennessee Region. Harold Coker served as the national AACA president in 1972. Harold, Lillian, and Corky Coker were honored guests at the ETR business meeting in 2011.

Tupelo MS Automobile Museum to Close, Its Contents Sold to Benefit Charitable Educational Foundation

By Dennis Said Jane Spain's favorite car in the Tupelo Automobile Museum is a 1954 Mercury Sun Valley. Painted a pale yellow, its innovative and distinctive plexiglass panoramic roof allowed passengers to soak up the views.

And that's what she and her late husband, Frank, did in the late 1990s, when they drove the car from Alaska back to Tupelo. The memories of that trip — even when the car broke down in the Yukon, where they had to wait a few days for parts — are indelibly etched in her mind.

"It was an awesome adventure," she said with a smile.

But the Sun Valley, along with the other 177 vehicles in the museum, will be sold at auction in late April, never to be gathered under one roof again.

Spain made the bittersweet decision to sell the cars because, after 16 years, it was no longer sustainable to run the museum. Most importantly, she said it was time to do what the construction of the museum was meant to do – fund a charitable educational foundation Frank had envisioned.

Proceeds from the sale of the collection – whose value ranges from nearly \$10 million to perhaps twice as much or even more – will go to the foundation.

"Every nickel will go toward it," Jane said. "I'm not keeping any of it."

Nor is she keeping any of the cars, despite the many memories and stories that so many of them hold. Not even the beloved Sun Valley.

"I have plenty of memories, but you know, if I clung to every memory, I'd keep so many of them and then I'd feel guilty if I didn't keep this one or that one," she said. "So my thing is it needs to make more memories – all of them do."

The cars will all find new homes. Some will go to collectors, some will likely go to museums in Europe and elsewhere. But Spain hopes that some of them, like the Sun Valley, will be driven again.

"They have sat here, and we took very good care of them, but they need to be out on the road, and they need to start new experiences," she said. "Most will hopefully go somewhere where somebody will make new memories with them."
