

The "Garage Tour" with the Classic Ford Club in April allowed club members to visit 3 different garages with cars galore and more memorabilia







"One wheel at a time!" Those were the words emphasized by Master Mechanic Daniel Paransky as he began disassembly of the rear brake system on Tom Howard's 1957 Chevrolet.

As the class, consisting of East Tennessee Region members and guests, learned about hydraulic brakes, co-host Barbara McGovern was assisted by members Loretta Rollins and Sandra Quillin in the preparation of sandwiches and other goodies for the group.

Tom made his Chevy available to the club for the tech day, which was held at Paransky's Machine Shop in Greenback.

Tom's car had an issue with the left rear brake binding and

overheating. It made a for a perfect troubleshooting project for the tech session.

It wasn't long before Dan and his assistant, Stanley Wade found the cause of the problem. A rubber brake hose had collapsed internally, preventing the return of brake fluid to the master cylinder. While the wheel was apart, Dan and Stan demonstrated the correct way to rebuild a wheel cylinder.

"Wheel cylinders are cheap," one of the students said. "Why not just replace them?"

Stanley explained that rebuilding is the better option when your shop is located in the back woods. "Besides," Stan said, "a wheel cylinder that we rebuild will be better than a new one." "It's usually better to repair than replace," he explained.

Dan and Stan's wisdom was interspersed with jokes and wise cracks as they raised the car higher on the lift to further examine the brake system.

"This is what we call an I.O.," Dan said as he pointed to a minor oil leak. "That stands for Income Opportunity!"

By the end of the day, the oil leak had been fixed and Tom's brake problem had been diagnosed from stem to stern. Dan concluded the tech day by showing the group a wide variety of special automotive tools and unusual wrenches that are used in the trade.

The East Tennessee Region is fortunate to have Dan, Barbara, and Stan as resources whenever we need a car repair, a delicious sandwich, or just a good laugh.

June ETR Tour Explores the "Missing Link" of the Foothills Parkway

The magnificent Foothills Parkway is perhaps the oldest unfinished highway in United States. Commissioned by Congress in 1948, the road is designed to skirt the northern and western perimeter of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. The fabled "missing link" section between Walland TN and Wears Valley finally opened in the fall of 2018.

In June, the East Tennessee Region traveled the parkway, with its breathtaking views and treacherous curves. The tour was hosted by Charlie Simpson and Dallas and Liz Burns. As an added treat, Charlie's sister, Becky Love, made a delightful batch of cookies for everyone to eat along the way.

Unfortunately, the weather was less than cooperative during the tour. A strong storm front was barreling toward the Smokies as ETR members and guests gathered just South of Maryville. Opening comments and driving directions were brief before the group headed out for the parkway, just ahead of the storm clouds.

As the journey progressed through Walland, the ETR members and guests entered the "Missing Link."

This section was the most difficult part of the Parkway to build. The road had to be cut into the side of the mountain that overlooks Townsend and the valley below. It stands as a monu-

In addition, there were 16 vehicles competing for the coveted Zenith Award, arguably the highest AACA award given.

This year there was a change in the requirement of a Senior Award vehicle being eligible to enter in the AACA Annual Grand National. Previously any Senior Award recipient had to wait until the following year to be eligible for the AACA Grand National. With the change, a car can compete in a Grand National meet in the same year it achieved its AACA Senior Award.

There is only one Grand National event each year. The Grand National is hosted in Western or Central Divisions on the odd numbered years and the East and Southeast Region in the even numbered years.

Since Sherry and I were showing our 57 we did not have a lot of time to look around at all the cars on the show field as we were concentrating on getting our 57 ready. The people at Auburn are great, very friendly, helpful, and encouraging.

The town of Auburn is a great place to host an event like this. Several museums are located in Auburn like the Auburn, Cord and Duesenberg Museum, the National Automotive and Truck Museum, Early Ford V8 Foundation and Museum, National Military History Center, as well as the Kruse Museum and Hoosier Air Museum. Next year the Spring Nationals will be in Auburn (May 28 – 30). Sherry & I are already making plans to attend!

Robert Quillin Spots a One-of-Kind Stainless Steel 1936 Ford Sedan

One of my favorite automobiles on our recent trip to the AACA Grand Nationals in Auburn, Indiana was a 1936 Ford Tudor Sedan with a stainless-steel body.

In 1936, Allegheny Ludlum, a steel company based in Pennsylvania had Ford build six stainless steel bodied 1936 sedans. The six sedans were all standard production vehicles except for their stainless-steel bodies. Allegheny Ludlum Company had the patent for stainless steel in 1936. All six Fords were put in Allegheny's fleet and the stainless bodied Fords were used to promote the use of stainless steel. The six Fords were driven for about 10 years. In 1946 these Fords were all retired with about 200,000 miles on each of them. Two were damaged beyond repair during use by Allegheny's employees, two are still retained by Allegheny's company and two are in museums. Joe Floyd, a South Dakota businessman and Ford collector donated his 1936 stainless steel Ford to the Early Ford V8 Foundation Museum in Auburn, Indiana. The original finish on the 1936 Fords was a natural metal sheen that was neither dull nor shiny. Joe Floyd's 1936 stainless steel Ford underwent approximately 1000 hours of polishing! He also donated 17 other 1936 Fords. Floyd donated one million dollars to the museum which provided the museum 10,000 additional square feet to house Floyd's collection of 1936 Fords. His collection is unique because it included an example of all the models offered by Ford in 1936. This section of the museum is set up like a 1936 Ford dealership and is named Floyd Motors.

I encourage anyone traveling near Auburn to partake of an afternoon enjoying the history and vehicles of the Early Ford V8 Foundation Museum.

So we tuned up the Vair, changed the oil, changed the spark plugs, and put together a spare parts kit that included essential ignition parts, a fuel pump, and of course a spare fan belt. We also swapped out the period-correct bias ply tires for the utilitarian radials. We were ready.

Having served on the East Tennessee Region's 2015 Divisional Tour Committee, Jan and I were looking forward to enjoying this tour without having any responsibilities.
