Remembering Our Friend Blake McCampbell

I knew Blake McCampbell for 19 years. That's a lot less time than many ETR members knew him. I'm sure everyone who had the honor to know Blake has precious memories of their time with him. These are a few of mine.

Blake was one of the few people I remember distinctly from the first East Tennessee Region meeting Jan and I attended in November of 2001. His welcoming words and sincere smile,

along with that ever-present twinkle in

his eye, sealed the deal on our decision to join the club. It would be the beginning of many tours, meetings, and meets with Blake, Sue, Angie, Preston, and Lindsey. Blake and Sue were the essence of fellowship, combined with a love of old cars.

Blake's father, Emory, was one of the founding members of the East Tennessee Region. Blake was just a kid when the club began back in 1956. Being the youngest regular attendee at the early ETR events earned Blake the lifetime title of "Charter Brat." As years went by, Blake and his father would restore several vintage cars, including the 1952 Ford Pickup that once belonged to Blake's grandfather, and the Model A Roadster that his dad purchased and drove home from Wisconsin. These cars, and others were engrained in the McCampbell family history, and were still owned and driven regularly when Blake passed away last May.

Every vehicle in Blake's garage had a story, and Blake took great pleasure in recalling the history of his cars and Cushman scooters, several of which had been passed down from one generation to the next.

While Blake wasn't driving his antique cars, he was restoring them. And he restored them to perfection. His two Cushmans achieved Grand National Senior awards. His Model A Roadster and Nash Metropolitan were also National First Place award winners.

His last project was the restoration of the 1949 Ford Convertible that he and Sue had owned and enjoyed for many years as a "driver." Restoring the Ford was a retirement project that began around 2010 and culminated with a Grand National Victory in 2013.

"I'm not sure I've got another restoration in me," Blake said

before beginning the nut & bolt reconstruction of the Ford. But with the help of master restorer, Eddie Skeen, the car made the transformation from an old car, rich in patina, to a classic show-stopper.

Blake didn't just love cars. He loved people. And he loved being an active participant in the organizations to which he belonged. As a Shriner, Blake transported children in need of medical care from their homes to the Shriners Childrens Hospital in Lexington, KY.

He also enjoyed being involved in the organization of AACA events. Blake, Sue, and his family were instrumental in the planning and execution of every national event that was ever hosted by the East Tennessee Region. In 2015, Blake put together an entire day of touring for the Southeast Divisional Tour, which featured an excursion through sections of Blount County and the Smoky Mountains that only a telephone lineman would know about.

To say that Blake was active in our club would be a gross understatement. He seldom missed an ETR event, and he hosted many monthly tours. He also served as president of the East Tennessee Region in 1980 and 2004. No one knew the back roads of the East Tennessee Foothills better than Blake. He delighted in leading the ETR members through the remote wilderness of Blount County.

So many people have so many memories of Blake and Sue McCampbell. I have many and have tried to relate a few here. If you knew Blake at all, you have your own precious memories of him. Those memories will surely be cherished forever.

Marshall England Locates and Brings Home a 1955 Bentley



Marshall England's 1955 Type R Bentley Four Door Saloon

I found my 1955 Type R Bentley 4 door saloon (sedan) in Hemmings Motor News in January 2020.

It was located in Binghamton, New York and a body off restoration had been completed in 2019 after an extensive (and expensive) search for parts, many of which had to be ordered from England. The mechanic who did most of the work gave an example in which one part for the transmission cost \$2,400 there versus \$125 for the comparable part for a US car.

The engine, transmission and clutch were rebuilt as needed and the body received multiple coats of new paint in a black over gray combination with red pin striping. The chrome and red leather interior were perfect when the restoration was begun and were covered with protective paper during the mechanical procedures. The undercarriage was stripped of all surface rust, old paint and grease, then primed and painted with rust preventive POR 15 paint. The white wall tires were relatively new and did not need replacing.

The car is heavy, weighing about 5100 lbs. and has a very

smooth ride. Before I purchased it, I looked up the following information on 1952 through 1955 Type R's in Wikipedia:

The Type R is a 4-door saloon with a 4.6-liter engine, straight 6cylinder, 130 hp. The transmission was a 4-speed standard or optional automatic. Except for the radiator shell and carburetor, it was almost a replica of its sister the Rolls Royce Silver Cloud. It was considered a stop-gap version before the S series Bentleys in late '55-'56 which had restyled bodies with the front and rear fenders blending smoothly with each other. Although there was little difference between the type R's and Silver Clouds, the former outsold the latter by 2500 units to 760.





The Hodges' Packard has a Rich History plus East Tennessee Connections

In May of 1927 a 143-inch wheelbase chassis of a new Packard automobile (without a body) was purchased for the Edward H. Butler family of Buffalo, New York, and delivered to the Brunn Body Company, also in Buffalo, to have a hand-crafted aluminum body built on the chassis.



The Hodges' 1927 Packard was originally used to transport foreign dignitaries while visiting Buffalo NY.

It was only appropriate that the Butler family, who owned the Buffalo Evening News, have a formal chauffeur-driven automobile to use for the various foreign dignitaries the visited the Buffalo area mainly during the summer months.

When the new town car/landualet body was completed, along with the latest new steel wire wheels (also made in Buffalo) that replaced the wooden wheels, the finished product was a chauffeur-driven automobile weighing 4,660 pounds with a division window between the driver and the passenger compartments as well as a rear quarter top that would open to permit the rear seat passengers to view the surrounding area as well as be seen by the local people. The car was only used on special occasions as the Butlers owned several other vehicles for their daily use.

The Packard was used by the Butler family for this purpose from 1927 until 1944. During World War II the big 700 x 21 tires were removed and given to the rubber/scrap drive to aid the U. S. War effort.

In 1946 the Packard was purchased by Ed George, chief of the

North Java, New York, Fire Department, where it was used for various duties, one of which was a parade vehicle-squad car, which also doubled for the transportation of iced-down beverages for the fireman to drink as they walked alongside the Packard, The beverages were kept in the large leathercovered trunk mounted on the Packard's rear luggage rack.

The fire department used the Packard until approximately 1954, when a Mr. Stone, who owned a water well-drilling business from Soddy-Daisy, Tennessee, discovered the car on a trip to New York, purchased it for \$450, and transported the formal Packard back to Tennessee.

In 1962 a friend of Mr. Stone, Roy Johnson, who owned the Johnson Spring Company in Jefferson City, Tennessee purchased the Packard and drove the less than 5300 actual mile car home.

My first recollection of the Packard was as a young man with an interest in antique automobiles and participating in the

Hillbilly Homecoming Fourth of July parades with my 1931 Chevrolet roadster that I had purchased in 1956. (Editor's Note: Jerry's '31 Chevrolet is featured in the April-May edition of the Antiquer)

Roy Johnson's son, Danny, would bring the Packard to the local parades and shows in our area and used the car for transportation while attending the University of Tennessee in Knoxville.

In 1965 the Packard developed some minor engine trouble that required the straight eight-cylinder engine to be removed from the chassis for the repair. Mr. Johnson and his son, Danny, decided while they had the engine out of the car it would be an opportune time to do a detailed paint restoration on the 11, 808 -mile car. The rest of the car was disassembled (body and drivetrain removed.)

Unforeseen circumstances and a hitch in the U.S. Army for Danny put the restoration on hold, and the various parts of the Packard were stored in a corner area of the spring factory building. The stripped chassis was chained to the ceiling so as not to take up any more space than needed.

Events and time go by fast and the disassembled Packard sat in the same pace for 17 years until October 1982, when, after the death of Roy, the Johnson family sold the spring factory to another company with the understanding that the old Packard was not part of the business and would be removed from the building.

I was fortunate enough to purchase the Packard in its disassembled state of which approximately 90-95% of the original parts survived and were still with the car stored in various areas of the spring factory.

After a few months of trying to sort out the jigsaw puzzle of Packard parts, I began the painstaking job of restoration and reassembly of the car.

With only 11,808 actual miles on the Packard, most all of the parts only needed to be repainted or re-chromed and some of the upholstery material needed replacing. The original leather top, which folded down and also covered the passenger area, had to be replaced by master craftsman J. H. "Pop" Rice, of Harriman, Tennessee. Most of the other paint work was done locally and in the paint shop at Twin City Buick.

The original all-black color was modified in that a light gray with an accent area of a darker gray was painted on the town car/ landaulet body.

Automotive Pioneer Charles F. Kettering

"It doesn't matter if you try and try and try again, and fail. It does matter if you try and fail and fail to try again" Charles Kettering.

Charles Kettering's automotive inventions included the electric starter for vehicles, quick-drying automobile paints and finishes, "anti-knock" fuels, variable-speed transmissions, the storage battery, voltage regulator, generator, electric automobile lights, four- wheel brakes, spark plugs.

His non-automotive inventions include the electric cash register, an incubator for premature babies, the Delco light (a light/ power source for places not accessible to power lines), freonbased refrigeration (Kettering's home was the first in the US to have air conditioning), an aerial torpedo, which is credited as the first aerial missile, and the Kettering hypertherm, used to treat syphilis of the brain. In all, Kettering held US 186 patents.

Charles Kettering was born in Ohio in 1876. Upon graduation in 1904 from The Ohio State University (at the age of 27 with a degree in electrical engineering), he was hired by the National Cash Register Company (NCR) as head of their research laboratory. In 1909, he and NCR colleague Edward A. Deeds founded the Dayton Engineering Laboratories Company (DELCO).

General Motors purchased DELCO in 1918 as a part of the United Motors Company. In 1920, Charles Kettering became vicepresident of the General Motors Research Corporation, and remained in that position for more than 25 years. Charles Kettering died in 1958 and is buried in Dayton, Ohio. Kettering was also a philanthropist, establishing the C. F. Foundation for the Study of Chlorophyll and Photosynthesis at Antioch College in Yellow Springs, OH. Along with industrialist Alfred Sloan, he funded the Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research in New York City.

Kettering said "My interest is in the future because I am going to spend the rest of my life there." Certainly, he played a major role in shaping the future of the automotive industry, as well as medical science.
